2.	Recap of Joint SI & OE Workgroup Meeting	During the joint workgroup meeting, the two domains explored overlaps in their action plans and objectives.
		Nicole Hayden from the 50/50 Mentoring Collaborative presented on impactful intergenerational projects at the Newburg Community Center in partnership with OSHN. The workgroup decided to move forward with collaborating with Nicole and discussed ways to engage with 50/50 Mentoring.
		Next possible steps identified:
		 Invite Nicole to future workgroup meetings to further define the collaboration and identify which subcommittee will take the lead. Explore applying for an AARP Community Challenge Grant (\$2,500-\$10,000 for quick-action projects to enhance livability for all ages). Deadline: March; project completion: November. Consider writing a joint grant proposal. Discuss potential projects such as mural or bench maintenance. Leverage connections to grant-writing nonprofits (e.g., Erin C.'s contact or OE facilitator Becky). Consult with Becky (OE) to identify specific Outdoor Enhancement projects for involvement. Engage a community garden facilitator for collaboration. Explore project opportunities near libraries, as suggested by the LFPL representative at kickoff. Continue supporting the Newburg Lawn Service initiative, where youth provide lawn care for seniors, extend and possibly expand to other areas.

Local artist and author was encouraged by Sandra to submit a proposal to exhibit; high attendance fees could be a barrier Diane will follow up on exhibitors for the conference. 7.	Updates from the Subcommittees	 Contact interested schools and facilities for partnerships Sandra informed the group about an intergenerational initiative called Help Us Grow (HUG). H.U.G. is a national nonprofit focused on improving 3rd-grade reading proficiency, building social skills, and fostering resilience in students to reduce the school-to-prison pipeline and strengthen communities. Founded in 2008, H.U.G. uses the evidence-based Learning Together curriculum and the BE THE DIFFERENCE™ initiative to promote positive behavior and social change. Since its 2016 launch, H.U.G. has expanded from one school to six, serving over 130 students and introducing the H.U.G. Ambassadors program to empower older students as role models. Only 3 states are involved so far: Massachusetts, Florida and Kentucky (Cane Elementary and Eminence Elementary in Shelbyville) The Social Inclusion Workgroup is planning to explore involvement with HUG, a nonprofit focused on preventing the school-to-prison pipeline by improving 1st to 3rd-grade reading proficiency and fostering intergenerational connections. This initiative aligns with the workgroup's goal of combating social isolation through meaningful programs. HUG program for reading (virtual), background checks are done on tutors by HUG Book sent to senior and kid to reach together via Zoom Next steps: Potential partnership schools, Kane, Greenwood, Retired teachers associations JCPS board meetings open to public Back door or front door inform AARP volunteers
